REVIEW OF RECENT QSAC PROGRESS

NPS has made significant recent progress towards local control:

- 2008: Earned local control over Operations
- 2014: Earned local control over Fiscal Management
- 2016 Summer:
 - Personnel: Earned local control over Personnel, contingent on development of approved Transition Plan
 - Governance: Improved to 88: NJDOE did not return control but set clear path for return
 - Instruction and Program (I&P): Improved to 64 and equivalency application approved and set clear path for return
- 2016-17 (Expected):
 - 2016-17 Fall-Winter: Working with QSAC DPR Committee to develop a Transition Plan to

officially transfer control over Personnel to School Board

NJ Dept. of Ed. will visit to review deficient indicators only in 2017 Spring:

Governance and I&P

- 2017 Summer: Next round of scores expected to be available
- 2017 Summer-Fall: Anticipate that State Board will meet and approve resolution to

begin transition process

2017 Fall-Winter: Anticipate working with DPR Committee to develop Transition Plan

for Commissioner's approval to officially transfer control over **Governance and I&P** to School Board

NPS QSAC EFFORTS REMAIN ON TRACK

NPS will receive a modified QSAC review this year. We expect this review to maintain existing path and timeline to earn local control.

The Fall 2016 Self-Evaluation includes:

- A self-evaluation for submission to NJ Dept. of Education
- Collaboration with a committee to review self-evaluation
- Public presentation of this submission (that will be available on the NPS web site)

■ The Spring 2017 Review will focus exclusively on:

- The sustained progress in Governance
- Progress on the metrics in the Instruction and Program (I&P) Equivalency
- This review <u>will not</u> include a comprehensive, multi-day visit covering all indicators of all five areas



NATIONAL CONTEXT

Nationally, increases in reading have been elusive.

- PARCC Scores are closely related to NAEP scores.
- NAEP Scores have been largely flat for over 20 years.

Grade	NJ PARCC (ELA/L)	NJ NAEP (Reading)
Grade 4	51%	42%
Grade 8	52%	46%
Grade 11/12	41%	41%

INTERNATIONAL TRENDS

- While American scores are flat, not all countries are:
 - According to a 2016 PISA report, developed countries that are outperforming counterparts do the following:
 - 1. Recruit and retain top talent
 - 2. Invest in early childhood pre-school programs
 - 3. Adopt consistent, rigorous academic standards
 - 4. Provide ongoing professional development for teachers and leaders
 - 5. Prioritize lowest achieving students

NPS EFFORTS OVER LAST 5 YEARS

1. Recruit and Retain Top Talent

 New evaluation tools and innovative teachers contract have helped us retain 95% of our highly effective and effective educators while only 63% of ineffective teachers returned last year

2. Invest in early childhood pre-school programs

Added ~500 pre-K seats and adopted Common Core aligned version of Creative Curriculum

3. Adopt consistent, rigorous academic standards

 NPS was an early adopter the Common Core Standards and Interim Assessments aligned with those standards

4. Provide ongoing professional development for teachers and leaders


 Created Principal Leadership Institute (PLI), Vice Principal Institute (VPLI) and Leadership Institute for Teacher Teams (LIFTT) to develop educators

5. Prioritize lowest achieving students


 Provide 100 minute literacy block with 40 minutes of targeted instruction and extended school day. We also have adopted software that remediates gaps and a new Special Education system (EasyIEP)

NPS HAS MADE SIGNIFICANT PROGRESS


This has led to real progress in Language Arts Literacy for our students.



SGP Scores have been better each of the last 4 years in LAL



PARCC improvement in LAL is outpacing the State average



Newark schools now outperform 72% of similar districts (DFG A)


Despite progress - as the scores below show – there remains significant and urgent need for improvement.

PROGRESS IN LANGUAGE ARTS LITERACY

We are on track to implementing strategies 1, 2, and 3 in Strategic Plan for literacy.

- Strategy 1 Consistent, district-wide approach to instruction
 - 4 key investments: Everybody writes, aggressive monitoring, habits of discussion, and literacy interventions.
- Strategy 2 Ensure all teachers have access to high-quality curriculum and assessment tools
 - For example: LearnZillion for grades 3 8
- Strategy 3 Provide more intensive supports for students who need them most
 - For example: System 44 implemented for grades 3 12



SUPPORTING THE INVESTMENTS

1. Improved Curricular Resources for Educators

- Investing thousands of hours to make resources more accessible for educators
- Providing educators w/ differentiated resources for struggling readers and ELL students

2. More Direct Coaching

- Re-organized central office to allow staff to provide more direct coaching and support
- 5 literacy coaches now spend 80% of time training principals, vps, and teachers directly



SUPPORTING THE INVESTMENTS



3. Increased Progress Monitoring

- Implemented improved interim assessments aligned to standards
- LearnZillion platform allows us to better monitor student reading progress
- Administer Reading Inventory assessment 4x per year to ensure students are on track to meet individualized growth goals

4. Expanded Interventions for Struggling Readers

- Piloted System 44 last spring
- Implemented district-wide this year in grades
 3 12
- 2000 students receiving literacy interventions this year

EARLY EXAMPLE OF SUCCESS

Example:

Benjamin Franklin Elementary School

- Adopted System 44 for a cohort of struggling readers in February 2016
- In November 2016, 100% of the students in the cohort "graduated" and are advancing as decoders.
- Franklin will serve four times as many students with System 44 this year.
