Why are we here?

The Every Student Succeeds ACT of 2015 requires that each Title I School hold an Annual Meeting of Title I parents for the purpose of...

- Informing you of your school's participation in Title I
- Explaining the requirements of Title I
- Explaining your rights as parents to be involved

What is **Title I?**

- Title I is the major component of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) and the largest federal assistance program for our nation's schools.
- The goal of Title I is a higher quality of education for <u>every</u> child.
- The program serves millions of children in elementary and secondary schools each year. East Side High School is a Title I school.

How Title I Works?

- Title I funding flows from the U.S. Department of Education (as appropriated by Congress) to the New Jersey Department of Education (FDOE).
- The NJDOE allocates funds to Newark Public Schools based on the number of low-income children that reside in the District.
- Title I schools spend the funds allocated based on the Annual School Planning system application (ASPS).
- East Side HIgh School implements a Title I School-wide Program.

Title I Programs Provide Support

- Smaller classes;
- Additional teachers and paraprofessionals;
- Additional training for school staff;
- Extra time for instruction (Before and/or After School Programs);
- A variety of supplemental materials and equipment.
- Parental Involvement Activities; and/or

Title | Funds

- East Side High School generates \$701,962 through Title I to pay for programs and services for our students.
- Title I funds are blended into the local budget and support the following programs and services:
- Tutoring Services
- Smart Goals 1-5
- Goal 1: Literacy
- Goal 2: Increase school wide Math Scores
- Goal 3: Intervention and Parent outreach
- Goal 4: College & Career readiness Goal
- Goal 5: Social & emotional
- Extra Curricular/ After School Activities

SMART Goals

Literacy/Math SMART Goal

By June of 2021: At least 55% of students will meet their projected MAP growth RIT score in ELA and MATH.

<u>Attendance SMART Goal</u>

Through interventions and parent outreach, our chronic absenteeism rates in each grade level will drop by 2% in the 20-21 school year as compared to the 19-20 SY, as measured in the ASP.

College & Career Readiness SMART Goal

By June 2021 -80% of the three 11th grade cohorts will get at least a C or above in 10 ECC courses for 31 college credits by participating in a tutoring program tailored to meet needs of student

-80% of the two 12th grade cohorts will get a C or above in 10 ECC courses for 31 college credits through participating in early college planning and being mentored through the process.

Who Decides How Funds Are Used?

- Various stakeholders collaborate throughout the school year. The stakeholder groups are composed of:
 - ✓ Parents/Guardians
 - ✓ Principal
 - ✓ Teachers
 - Other staff that works at the school
 - ✓ Students
 - Community members and organizations

Parent's Rights

- Be involved and request regular meetings to express your opinions and concerns.
- Be provided information on your child's level of achievement and academic growth, if applicable and available, on each of the State academic assessments.
- Be timely notified when your child has been assigned, or has been taught for 4 or more consecutive weeks by a teacher who does not meet applicable State certification or licensure requirements at the grade level and subject area in which the teacher has been assigned.

Working Together!

- The ESSA law requires that all Title I schools and families work together.
