<u>Tips for Creating Student Alphabet Books</u>



The student created alphabet book becomes a personalized anchor for students to use as their learning progresses. It also motivates them to continually learn and make connections.

	The alphabet book is to contain the uppercase and lowercase letters that the student
	can fluently identify, arranged alphabetically.
	So as not to confuse learners, only known letters are entered at first, with pages left
	blank for the letters to be learned. The alphabet book does not necessarily begin with A .
	Use the backs of pages so there are enough pages for all the letters.
	☐ If you have extra pages you can include digraphs or blends
	The alphabet book is a resource for the student:
	$\hfill \square$ as a record of the letters learned and the student's personal links to the
	corresponding sounds,
	$\hfill\Box$ as well as a reminder that letters are finite; there are only 52 in the full set for
	English.
	Each page of the student's alphabet book shows the uppercase letter first, its lowercase
	mate next, followed by a single image representing the letter.
	$\hfill \square$ If they are able to label their picture with the word for the picture they should do
	SO.
	The student chooses and draws the picture whose first letter and sound represent their
	choice for a link to that letter.
	$\hfill\Box$ The process continues until all the letter pairs easily identified by the student are
	entered in the book and accompanied by a representative picture.

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
