STANDARDS OF CONDUCT

The Board of Education believes that an effective instructional program requires an orderly school environment and that the effectiveness of the educational program is, in part, reflected in the behavior of students.

The Board expects students and staff to conduct themselves in keeping with their level of maturity, with a proper regard for the rights and welfare of themselves, other students, for school personnel, for the educational purpose underlying all school activities, and for the care of school facilities and equipment.

The Board believes that standards of student behavior must be set cooperatively by interaction among the students, parents/guardians, staff and community, producing an atmosphere that encourages students to grow in self-awareness and self-discipline. Such an atmosphere must include respect for self and others, as well as for Board and community property.

In its efforts to promote positive student behavior and creating safe learning environments, the Board believes that student engagement is critical. The Board and its schools shall offer meaningful opportunities for students to participate collaboratively with all members of the school community. Students should have the opportunity to participate in school-wide initiatives and leadership development activities, and to provide meaningful input in the development of positive behavior systems.

SCHOOL SUPPORT STRATEGIES

POSITIVE BEHAVIOR SUPPORTS AND INTERVENTIONS

Every effort will be made to encourage and promote positive student development and student behavioral expectations. Positive behavior supports and suggested interventions are included in the Student Discipline Code of Conduct with every Inappropriate or Disruptive Behavior level.

Each school has developed strategies for Progressive Discipline that uses incremental interventions to encourage accountability and behavioral change. Prevention and intervention strategies include instruction of social and emotional skills; and the use of restorative practices, conflict resolution, mediation, violence prevention, and peer leadership.

In addition, specific plans for incentives and rewards in a systematic structured manner for acceptable behavior will be reflected at the school site.

INTERVENTION & REFERRAL SERVICES COMMITTEE (I&RS)

As mandated by state code (N.J.A.C. 6A:16-8), each school must implement a coordinated system for the planning and delivery of intervention and referral services designed to assist students who are experiencing learning, behavior, or health difficulties.

The Newark Board of Education has selected a collaborative model for the operation of the school-based I&RS Team. Consistent with the model, team members and the individuals requesting assistance jointly identify the specific student problem and, by consensus, develop and implement an I&RS pupil action plan. The action plan is usually implemented by the classroom teacher(s) and monitored by an I&RS Team member. Within a specified timeframe, the I&RS Team reconvenes to determine the effectiveness of the action plan. Based on data collected, appropriate next steps address the student's needs.

Student Misconduct

These behaviors/disruptions consist of a student impeding the orderly classroom procedures or interferes with the orderly operation of the school.

Restorative/Disciplinary Response

There is immediate intervention by the staff member who is supervising the student or who observes the inappropriate or disruptive behavior. This behavior allows the student and adults to take responsibility for his/her actions, understand what could have been done differently, and be given an opportunity to learn pro-social behaviors to repair the harm.

A proper and accurate record of the code of conduct and restorative/disciplinary response is maintained by the staff member.

Students may not be suspended for dress code violations.

Student Misconduct

These inappropriate and/or disruptive behaviors occur with frequency or seriousness tend to disrupt the learning climate of the school.

Student's misconduct is usually a result from the continuation of Level I behaviors/disruptions.

Behavior Modification/Disciplinary Response

In these instances, it is recommended that systematic processes are used to identify the root causes of the student's behavior. Strategies to prevent or correct student misconduct be implemented to assist in modifying student behavior. It is always recommended to allow for restorative responses, when possible.

As with any inappropriate and/or disruptive behavior, a proper and accurate record of the code of conduct and restorative/disciplinary response is maintained by the staff member. In addition, parental/guardian contact needs to be had so they are aware of the misconduct.

Student Misconduct

These inappropriate behaviors and/or disruptions are usually directed against persons or property.

Administrative/Disciplinary Response

health-based. Allow restorative response, when possible.

An administrator initiates disciplinary action by investigating the infraction and conferring with staff on the extent of the consequences.

An administrator meets with the student and confers with the parent about the student's misconduct and the resulting disciplinary response.

An administrator notifies police when appropriate.

A proper and accurate record of offenses and disciplinary actions is maintained by the administrator and staff member.

There is restitution of damages by the parent or guardian of any minor, to be collected in any court of competent jurisdiction, together with costs of suit.

FILE CODE 5131.7 - WEAPONS AND DANGEROUS INSTRUMENTS

The Board of Education prohibits the possession and/or use of firearms, other weapons, or instruments that can be used as weapons on school property, on a school bus, at any school function, or while in route to or from school or any school function.

For the purpose of this policy "weapon" includes but is not limited to those items enumerated in N.J.S.A. 2C:39-1r. The principal shall make the final determination that a particular object is a dangerous instrument in any case where there is a question of its possession or use posing a threat to pupils, staff or property.

Any pupil who is convicted or adjudicated delinquent for possession of a firearm or a crime while armed with a firearm or found knowingly in possession of a firearm on any school property, on a school bus, or at a school-based function shall be immediately removed from the school's regular education program pending a hearing before the Superintendent/designee to remove the pupil from the regular education program for a period of not less than one calendar year.

The principal/designee shall be responsible for the removal of such a pupil and shall immediately report the removal to the appropriate Assistant Superintendent. The Superintendent may modify a pupil's removal on a case-by-case basis. The principal shall also notify the appropriate law enforcement agency of a possible violation of the New Jersey Code of Criminal Justice.

A pupil found or observed on school property or at a school event in possession of a weapon or dangerous instrument other than a firearm shall be reported to the principal/designee immediately. The principal shall immediately inform the Superintendent/designee and appropriate law enforcement officials with all known information concerning the matter, including the identity of the pupil involved.

Assault by a pupil with a weapon on a teacher, administrator, board member or other employee of the board is strictly prohibited and shall result in the pupil's immediate removal from the general education program for a period not exceeding one calendar year. Subject to a hearing before the board, the pupil shall be placed in an alternative education program.

The Superintendent shall determine at the end of the year whether the pupil is prepared to return to the regular education program in accordance with procedures established by the Commissioner of Education.

Disciplinary action shall be taken against pupils who possess, handle, transmit or use firearms, other weapons, or dangerous instruments. Classified pupils shall be disciplined in accordance with their IEP and in compliance with law and administrative code. As in all disciplinary cases, due process will be provided (see policies 5114 Suspension and Expulsion and 5131 Conduct/Discipline).

A violence and vandalism report shall be filed whenever a pupil is found to be in possession of a firearm, other weapon, or dangerous instrument.

Disciplinary Response

Student misconduct within Level 4 infractions result in disciplinary responses that remove students from the classroom for long durations (i.e., no more than 10 days), and referrals to social service agencies, including government, community-based organizations, and health-based. Allow for restorative response, when possible.

DRUGS, ALCOHOL, TOBACCO (Substance Abuse)

Drugs, Alcohol, Tobacco and Steroids

It is the responsibility of the Board of Education to safeguard the health, character, citizenship, and personality development of the pupils in its schools. The Board recognizes that the misuse of drugs, alcohol, steroids, and tobacco threatens the positive development of students and the welfare of the entire school community. As such, the Board must maintain that the use of drugs and the unlawful possession and use of alcohol is wrong and harmful. The Newark Board of Education recognizes that the misuse of drugs, alcohol, tobacco or steroids threatens the positive development of that pupil and the welfare of the entire school community. The Board is committed to the prevention of drug, alcohol, tobacco and steroid abuse and the rehabilitation of identified abusers.

The Board recognizes that tobacco is a gateway drug and highly addictive and that the use of tobacco products is a health, safety, and environmental hazard for students, employees, visitors, and school facilities. The Board believes that the use of tobacco products on school grounds, in school buildings and facilities, on school property or at school-related or school-sponsored events is detrimental to the health and safety of students, faculty/staff and visitors. The Board acknowledges that adult employees and visitors serve as role models for students. The Board recognizes that it has an obligation to promote positive role models in schools and to promote a healthy learning and working environment, free from unwanted smoke and tobacco use for the students, employees, and visitors on the school campus. Finally, the Board recognizes that it has a legal authority and obligation pursuant to P.L. 2005, Chapter 383 New Jersey Smoke-Free Air Act as well as Smoke, Section 4303.

<u>Pupils</u>

For the purpose of this policy, "drug" includes all controlled dangerous substances set forth in N.J.S.A. 24:21-1 *et seq.* and all chemicals that release toxic vapors set forth in N.J.S.A. 2C:35-10.4 *et seq.*

The district Board prohibits the use, possession and/or distribution of any drug, alcohol, tobacco, or steroids on school premises, and at any event away from the school provided by the Board. Compliance with a drug-free standard of conduct at all school functions is mandatory for all pupils. Pupils suspected of being under the influence of drugs, alcohol, tobacco, or steroids will be identified, evaluated, and reported in accordance with the law. Assessment will be provided by individuals who are appropriately certified and trained in alcohol and other drug abuse prevention. A pupil who uses, possesses, or distributes drugs, alcohol, tobacco or steroids on school premises or while attending a school-sponsored activity will be subject to discipline that may include suspension or expulsion, and may be reported to appropriate law enforcement personnel. Pupils suspected of involvement with alcohol, drugs or steroids away from school premises for pupils who are affected by alcohol or other drug use will be provided by individuals who are certified or who are otherwise appropriately trained in drug and alcohol prevention, intervention, and follow-up. Treatment will not be at the Board's expense.

HARASSMENT, INTIMIDATION AND BULLYING

The Board of Education believes that a safe and civil environment in school is necessary for students to learn and achieve high academic standards. Since students learn by example, school administrators, faculty, staff, and volunteers are required to demonstrate appropriate behavior, treating others with civility and respect, and refusing to tolerate harassment, intimidation or bullying. Harassment, intimidation or bullying, like other disruptive or violent behaviors, is conduct that disrupts both a student's ability to learn and a school's ability to educate its students in a safe environment. Therefore, the school district will not tolerate acts of harassment, intimidation or bullying.

The Board expects all students to treat each other with civility and respect and not to engage in behavior that is disruptive or violent. The Board expects students to conduct themselves in keeping with their level of maturity, with a proper regard for the rights and welfare of other students, for school personnel, for the educational purpose underlying all school activities, and for the care of school facilities and equipment.

The standards of character education are an essential component of the District's Language Arts Literacy Component. The Board believes that with the appropriate infusion of character education into the school curriculum, modeling of appropriate behavior by adults; support and assistance of students in school, the community and home; our students will achieve the above standards of character education.

The Board prohibits acts of harassment, intimidation or bullying against any student. School responses to harassment, intimidation and bullying shall be aligned with the Board approved Code of Student Conduct in the Discipline Plan and Policy, which establishes standards, policies and procedures for positive student development and student behavioral expectations on school grounds, including on a school bus or at school sponsored functions. The Discipline Plan and Policy outlines the four levels of the Code of Conduct as it pertains to harassment, intimidation and bullying. The principal shall be responsible for ensuring the prompt investigation and response to all reports of harassment, intimidation, and bullying committed on school grounds, in activities and on school buses. In addition, the principal shall ensure that this policy is applied to incidents of harassment, intimidation and bullying that are committed off school grounds in cases where a school employee is made aware of such actions. The principal has the right and authority to impose a consequence on a student for conduct away from school grounds that is consistent with the board's approved Code of Student Conduct, pursuant to N.J.A.C. 6A:16-7.1 and N.J.A.C. 6A:16-7.5.

The principal has the right and authority to impose a consequence on a student for conduct away from school grounds that is consistent with the Board's approved Code of Student Conduct, pursuant to N.J.A.C. 6A:16-7.1 and N.J.A.C. 6A:16-7.6. This authority shall be exercised only when it is reasonably necessary for the student's physical or emotional safety, security and well-being or for reasons relating to the safety, security and well- being of other students, staff or school grounds, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 18A:25-2 and 18A:37-2, and when the conduct which is the subject of the proposed consequence materially and substantially interferes with the requirements of appropriate discipline in the operation of the school.

Bullying is unwanted, aggressive behavior that may involve a real or perceived power imbalance. "Harassment, intimidation or bullying" is defined as any gesture, any written, verbal or physical act, or any electronic communication, whether it be a single incident or a series of incidents, that is reasonably perceived as being motivated either by any actual or perceived characteristic, such as race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, or a mental, physical or sensory disability, or by any other distinguishing characteristic, that takes place on school grounds, at any school-sponsored function or on a school bus, or off school grounds, in accordance with law, that substantially disrupts or interferes with the orderly operation of the school or the rights of other students, and that:

- A. A reasonable person should know, under the circumstances, will have the effect of physically or emotionally harming a student or damaging the student's property, or placing a student in reasonable fear of physical or emotional harm to his/her person or damage to his/her property; or
- B. Insulting or demeaning any student or group of students; or
- C. Creating a hostile educational environment for the student by interfering with the student's education or by severely or pervasively causing physical or emotional harm to the student.

"Electronic communication" means a communication that is transmitted by means of an electronic device, including, but not limited to a telephone, cellular phone, computer, or pager.

CONSEQUENCES AND REMEDIAL MEASURES FOR ACTS OF HARASSMENT, INTIMIDATION OR BULLYING

Students

Consequences and remedial measures for a student who commits an act of harassment, intimidation or bullying shall be varied and graded according to the nature of the behavior, the developmental age of the student and the student's history of problem behaviors and performance. Consequences shall be consistent with the District approved Discipline Plan and Policy Code of Student Conduct and N.J.A.C. 6A:16-7. Consequences and remedial measures shall be designed to:

- A. Correct the problem behavior;
- B. Prevent another occurrence of the problem;
- C. Protect and provide support for the victim of the act; and
- D. Take corrective action for documented systemic problems related to harassment, intimidation or bullying.

Consequences and appropriate remedial actions for a student who commits an act of harassment, intimidation or bullying may range from positive behavioral interventions up to and including short and long-term suspension or expulsion, as permitted by law. The consequences and remedial measures may include, but are not limited to:

Consequences

- A. Admonishment;
- B. Temporary removal from the classroom;
- C. Deprivation of privileges;
- D. Classroom or administrative detention;
- E. Referral to disciplinarian;
- F. In-school suspension during the school week or the weekend; not to exceed four days (Level 3)
- G. Out-of-school suspension; not to exceed four days (Level 4)
- H. Legal action; and (Level 4)
- I. Expulsion (Level 4).

Classified students are subject to the same disciplinary procedures as nondisabled students and may be disciplined in accordance with their IEP. However, in accordance with law, before disciplining a classified student, it must be determined that:

- A. The student's behavior is not primarily caused by his/her educational disability;
- B. The program that is being provided meets the student's needs.

PUPIL SAFETY

The Board of Education recognizes the safety of its pupils as a consideration of utmost importance. The Superintendent shall consult law enforcement agencies, health and social service providers, emergency management planners and other school and community resources in the development of the plans, procedures and mechanisms for school safety. The Superintendent shall oversee development of a districtwide safety program with emphasis on accident prevention.

Student Access To Personal Cell Phones

Safety is the primary concern for the Board of Education (the "district") and the ability of parents and guardians to communicate with their children in an emergency situation is essential. Further, the district understands that students may need access to their cell phones when walking home from school or for after school activities that they may attend immediately upon leaving the school premises.

As such, the district allows students to carry cell phones concealed on their persons or carrying bags under the condition that the cell phones remain off (not on a silent ring or "vibrate" setting) at all times during the school day, on school premises, or at school functions. In the event of an emergency, the school administration (or the classroom teacher upon the direction of the school administration) will direct the students when they may safely turn on a cell phone.

If the student desires to carry a cell phone during the school day, the parent/guardian and student must execute a User Agreement specifically identifying the cell phone and acknowledging that the district assumes no responsibility for any loss or damage to the cell phone. The form must be on file in the school office before the device is brought to school.

Violation of this policy may be punishable as a Level III offense under the district's Discipline Plan and Policy. Further, the student's cell phone will be confiscated, the student's parent/guardian will be contacted to retrieve the phone, and cell phone carrying privileges may be suspended or revoked.
